

ADVENT CHRISTMAS

Once again, we come to the liturgical season of Advent/Christmas. While the rest of the world's attention is absorbed by the unstable economies, near or far; predictions of a 'fiscal cliff'; political parties that are dominated by ideologies and serving those ideologies instead of serving the people that have elected them; people so addicted and consumed by materialism and consumerism that in the end they themselves are being consumed – there is a deeper story occurring and unfolding.

This deeper story may receive some popular attention but only in the service of the prevailing ideologies and agendas. Few, sadly, very few people actually have a keener spirit to capture the ineffableness of the story that is unfolding. For those of us who are believers, it is the story of the Incarnation of the Son of God and the consequences of that Incarnation. There is an Advent hymn (SATB arrangement) based on Isaiah 35: 4-10, that captured my religious imagination the first time that I heard it and has ever since colored my understanding of Advent and Christmas. It is entitled 'Springs in the Desert' – there is at the very beginning a most beautiful tenor line that is both hopeful and haunting, in a beautiful clear and crisp tenor line above the organ arraignment the voice of the prophet cries out: 'Say to them that are of a fearful heart: Be strong! Fear

This is the greater Truth and the greater Hope that we must fix our hearts upon and not allow the roiling seas to rob us of that surety of the greater and eternal Good that asks of us to make it the foundation of our lives and dreams. Advent is also the time to 'get away' from the 'maddening crowds' and reflect upon this greater Hope and Truth – it is a time of re-centering our lives and aligning ourselves with the Mystery that the season celebrates.

One of the cherished values of Carmel is the value of silence – the time and space to listen actively and attentively to the Spirit of the Risen Lord that continually invites us deeper into that Friendship that the Lord desires to have with each of us. The Silence is not a negation but an opening to a deeper song that resides in the heart of creation, a song that longs for and invites the Final Coming of the King to restore what has been broken.

In the silence of their poverty they were told of an elected poverty chosen by God in order that we may be made rich in those things that alone endure. In the silence of their poverty St. Joseph attends to his Virgin Bride as she gives birth not in a room or even a hovel but in a stable of poverty, the Promise. The Promise of God's commitment to us made Flesh, a Flesh united to His own divine being.

May this Promise made Flesh be a source of blessing for each of you in whatever poverty you may find yourself and may your Hope be rooted in Him who is to come.

Life of St. Teresa of Avila (Part I of V) – by Fr. Stephen Sanchez

Wednesday, January 2nd and Saturday, January 5th | 10:00 am to 12:00 pm

Introduction to the 'Life' of Teresa: This is the first of the series of five presentations. This first conference will examine the social, political, and religious environment that shaped Teresa's surroundings and the development of her 'autobiography'.

Ash Wednesday Morning of Reflection – by Fr. Jerome Earley

Wednesday, February 13th | 10:00 am to 12:00 pm

Program will be followed by Mass and ashes. The topic of our Ash Wednesday morning of reflection will be an instruction on the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. Included will be an explanation of the Sacrament theologically, what constitutes a sin, and methods of making the confession.

Teresa: Transforming Grace: Book of her Life, Chapters 11-22. This conference will cover the famous '4 Waters' of prayer and how this became the source of her own transformation and lead her to a conformity of wills with her Friend Christ.

Teresa: New Life in Christ: Book of her Life, Chapters 23 - 31. This conference will cover the period of her 'Life' in which the fruit of prayer has brought harmony between the Friends as Christ lives Teresa.

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Warming the Cockles of the Fathers' Hearts

We are happy to announce that the Catholic Foundation has awarded Mount Carmel Center a \$35,000 grant to replace the heating system in the cloister of the monastery. The cloister is the area where the friars live, study and meditate.

The current heating system for a significant part of the building is the original 1952 central natural gas powered boiler system. Over the last few years, the system has been failing and is now at the point in which it cannot be repaired. At times the friars have lived with little-to-no heat in the winter due to continuing breakdowns of the system.

This grant provides for the installation of heat pumps to provide heating and more efficient air conditioning.

We are so excited to finally be able to permanently retire the asbestos cased natural gas powered boiler and improve the living conditions of the friars in both summer and especially winter. It is a heartwarming endeavor indeed.
