

Blessed Virgin Mary

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"God chose the lowly and despised of the world, those who count for nothing, to reduce to nothing those who are something."

(1 Cor 1:28)

This is a great mystery that gives us a glimpse into the heart of God, which is manifested all along the history of salvation. It is one of the ways in which he shows us that his ways are not our ways (Is 55:8) and that "the weakness of God is stronger than human strength", (1 Cor 1:25).

One of the most prominent examples of this divine tendency of using humble ways to bring about great works is a young and poor maiden from Nazareth named Mary. Without a doubt she has been the most remarkable woman that has walked this earth and yet, viewed through the lens of worldly standards she appears as a nobody. Being poor, a woman, very young, unknown and an Israelite (a people dominated by the Roman Empire), Mary had all the elements to be at the very bottom of the social ladder. In fact, she called herself "the handmaid [or slave girl] of the Lord",

(Lk 1:38).

This paradox that surrounds the mystery of Mary is beautifully expressed in her own words: "He [the Lord] has looked upon his handmaid's lowliness; behold, from now on will all ages call me blessed. The Mighty One has done great things for me..." (Lk 1: 48-49). Mary of Nazareth is lowly, but also great. These two elements, however, do not stand in opposition, quite the opposite. Mary has been exalted by God because she was lowly in the world's standards. She embodies the new standards of the Kingdom of God where the last are first and the first are last (Mt 20: 16). This poor and seemingly unimportant young lady is referenced in Sacred Scripture from Genesis (3: 15) to the book of Revelation (12: 1). She has been and will always be the most prominent work of God's merciful love, not only on her behalf, but on the behalf of all humanity. In and through her the eternal God immersed himself into our human drama in an unprecedented way and brought redemption and purpose to our human condition, lifting it to an unimaginable dignity. She has been given to us as our Mother (Jn 19: 26) and intercessor (Jn 2: 3).

It is into the mystery of the Blessed Virgin Mary that we invite all to immerse themselves with us at Mt. Carmel Center through our programs this year. It is our prayer that in doing so together we are able, with her help and example, to diminish according to world's standards so as to grow in the values of the Kingdom of her Son






